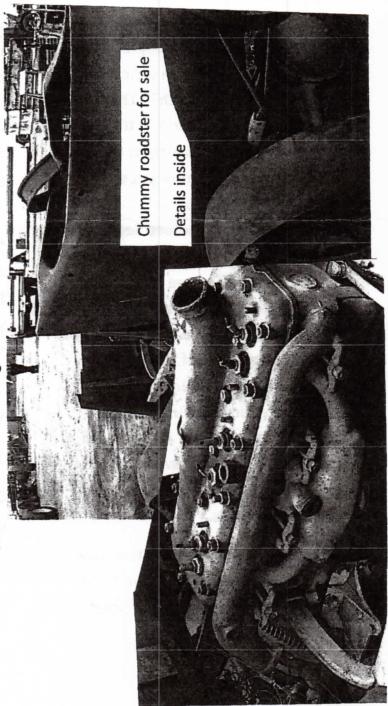

And I have talked to a number of potential Saxon owners wanting to know about the Saxon's advertised on Ebay and other publications. I have tried to be very fair and have disappointed several people. That brought me to write an article on "What is a Saxon worth?" The ironic thing is I can't include it in this issue! Saxon Records

(from "Saxon Days" Fall 1915)

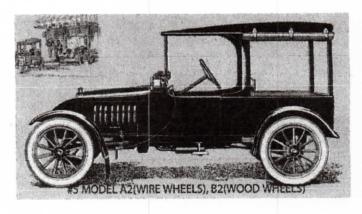
May 7, 1915 -May 18, 1915 -July 4, 1915 -July 7, 1915 -May 16, 1914 -April 2, 1915 -June 4, 1914 -April 6, 1914 -August 28, 1915 - Mrs Ella Wright and son Chester Wright drove a Saxon roadster from Jacksonville, Florida to Waterloo, Iowa. August 22, 1915 - Howard Piatt of Denver, Colorado won a wager by driving a Saxon roadster 302 miles at an average speed of 26.8 mph. Made the distance July 17, 1915 -July 15, 1915 -June 12, 1915 -June 1, 1915 -May 27, 1915 -March 29, 1915 -January 7, 1915 -December 26, 1914 - W. P. Hensley started on a trip across the snowcapped Rocky Mountains in a Saxon roadster. He made the trip from Boise, Idaho to July 10, 1915 -A Saxon "Six" won Charden, Ohio hill climb against a field of 30 cars. Saxon's time three seconds faster than the field A Saxon roadster won hill climb at Waynesville, North Carolina over Ford and Hupmobile. 25% grade H. L. Kreiner and B. Yingling drove from Du Bois, Pennsylvania to San Francisco, California in a Saxon roadster making the trip in 21 days --- covering 3600 miles at of total cost of \$34.96 for fuel.

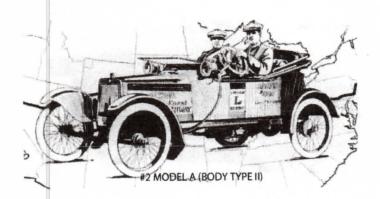
A Saxon "Six" won 2nd Pl. in a hill climb at Uniontown, Pennsylvania defeating Buick, Maxwell, Hispano (driven by De Palma), and Morris Dorr Skeels of Missoula, Montana drove a Saxon "Six" from the factory to his home. A 30 day endurance test was started by the Waterloo, lowa dealer. The car covered 150 miles per day keeping this average up over and incidentals was \$38.60. G. W. and J. W. Logan drove from Tiffin, Ohio to Los Angeles, California in a Saxon roadster. The entire expense including gasoline, oil Mrs. Emma T. Walsh drove a Saxon roadster from Fort Lauderdale, Florida to Moline, Illinois a distance of 1,385 miles In 11 hours and 23 minutes. A Saxon "Six" covered 490 miles from Los Angeles to San Francisco in 13 1/2 hours beating the Southern Pacific's fastest mail train miles per gallon of gasoline and 152 miles per quart of oil. and Ford. Time one minute 13 seconds. Saxon roadsters won first and second in a race at Lafayette, Indiana. Miss Kathleen Dee, Rock Island, Illinois won free-for-all race in a Saxon roadster. First woman to compete in automobile races in ten years The Detroit dealer started a 30 day run in a Saxon roadster. Over country roads for 30 days the car made a total of 4,500 miles Saxon dealers inaugurated dealers' "Driving Day". Each dealer drove 50 miles in a Saxon, writing the best story of the trip One hundred and five, Saxon "Sixes" covered 26,460 miles in economy drive from Detroit to hometowns of Saxon dealers. Averaged 21 A Saxon "Six" won hill climb at Stamford, Connecticut. Hill 7/8 mile long 15 to 18 percent grade. Defeated Stanley Steamer, Buick, Mercer. and established a record distance for a 30 day run. A 30 day run was started in a Saxon roadster in Boston. The daily mileage average was 214. In 30 days the car covered 6,423 miles New York dealer stages a 30 day run with a Saxon roadster. A total of 4,642 miles was covered, or an average of 155 miles per day A Saxon roadster was driven from Manila, Philippine Islands to Baguio. The trip was through the Mountains without the motor being stopped. A world's economy record of 35.5 miles per gallon of gasoline was established One hundred Saxon dealers from as many cities drove Saxon roadsters in a 200 - mile non-stop-run. Each car was driven 200 miles "Lark" by 15 minutes. Denver, Colorado a distance of 1,385 miles in the dead of winter - the most phenomenal record ever established Thirty miles per gallon was averaged. The Saxon roadster was the first car to cross the continent over the Lincoln Highway. It crossed 13 states in 30 days covering 3,389 miles. of 4,050 miles. Averaged 30 miles per gallon of gasoline, and 150 miles per quart of oil. The first prize went to the Jacksonville, Florida dealer. The Saxon roadster made 135 miles per day for 30 consecutive days in Detroit. It made 11 roundtrips each day over a 12 mile course, a total

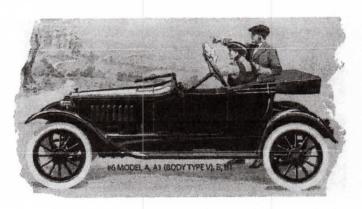

SAXON "4" MODEL IDENTIFICATION

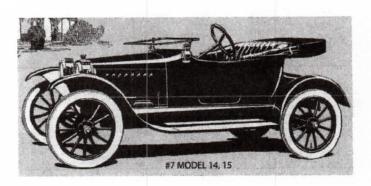


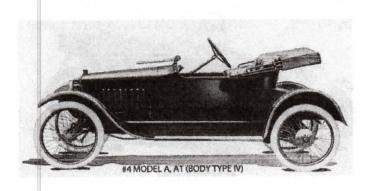


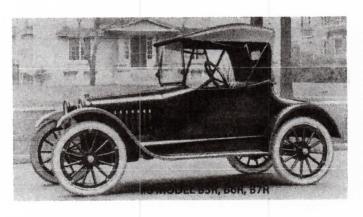
